



# ETF & Mutual Fund Rankings: Mid Cap Value Style

The Mid Cap Value style ranks eighth out of the twelve fund styles as detailed in our <u>1Q18 Style Ratings for</u> <u>ETFs and Mutual Funds</u> report. <u>Last quarter</u>, the Mid Cap Value style ranked eighth as well. It gets our Neutral rating, which is based on an aggregation of ratings of 10 ETFs and 161 mutual funds in the Mid Cap Value style as of January 22, 2018. Figures 1 and 2 show the best and worst rated ETFs and mutual funds in the style. Not all Mid Cap Value style ETFs and mutual funds are created the same. The number of holdings varies widely (from 29 to 2082). This variation creates drastically different investment implications and, therefore, ratings.

Investors seeking exposure to the Mid Cap Value style should buy one of the Attractive-or-better rated ETFs or mutual funds from Figures 1 and 2.

Fidelity Mid Cap Value K6 Fund (FCMVX) is excluded from Figure 2 because its total net assets (TNA) are below \$100 million and do not meet our liquidity minimums.

State Street SPDR Russell 1000 Yield Focus ETF (ONEY) is the top-rated Mid Cap Value ETF and Harbor Funds Mid Cap Value Fund (HNMVX) is the top-rated Mid Cap Value mutual fund. Both earn an Attractive rating.

There are no ETFs that receive an Unattractive-or-worse rating and Victory Integrity Mid Cap Value Fund (MAIMX) is the worst rated Mid Cap Value mutual fund. MAIMX earns a Very Unattractive rating.

#### The Danger Within




### PERFORMANCE OF HOLDINGs = PERFORMANCE OF FUND


