



## ETF & Mutual Fund Rankings: Small Cap Blend Style

The Small Cap Blend style ranks ninth out of the twelve fund styles as detailed in our [1Q18 Style Ratings for ETFs and Mutual Funds](#) report. [Last quarter](#), the Small Cap Blend style ranked tenth. It gets our Unattractive rating, which is based on an aggregation of ratings of 46 ETFs and 897 mutual funds in the Small Cap Blend style as of January 22, 2018. Figures 1 and 2 show the best and worst rated ETFs and mutual funds in the style. Not all Small Cap Blend style ETFs and mutual funds are created the same. The number of holdings varies widely (from 21 to 3124). This variation creates drastically different investment implications and, therefore, ratings.

Investors seeking exposure to the Small Cap Blend style should buy one of the Attractive-or-better rated ETFs or mutual funds from Figures 1 and 2.

WisdomTree U.S. MidCap Earnings Fund (EZM) is the top-rated Small Cap Blend ETF and Hartford Small Cap Core Fund (HSMFX) is the top-rated Small Cap Blend mutual fund. EZM earns an Attractive rating and HSMFX earns a Very Attractive rating.

PowerShares Russell 2000 Equal Weight Portfolio (EQWS) is the worst rated Small Cap Blend ETF and Small Cap ProFund (SLPSX) is the worst rated Small Cap Blend mutual fund. EQWS earns an Unattractive rating and SLPSX earns a Very Unattractive rating.

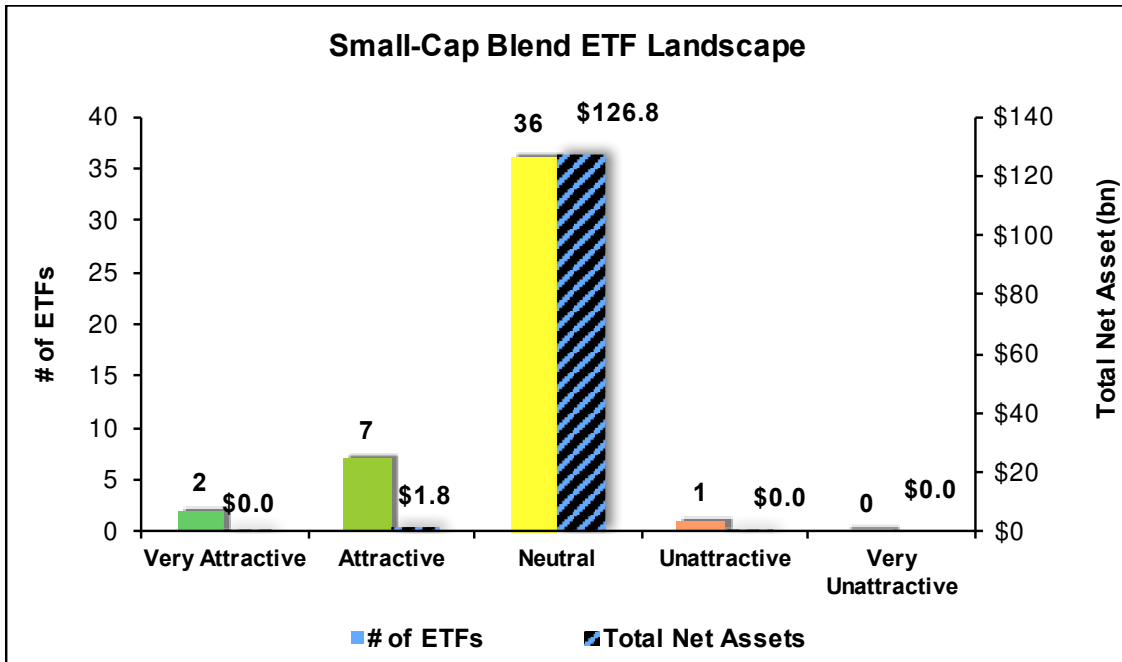

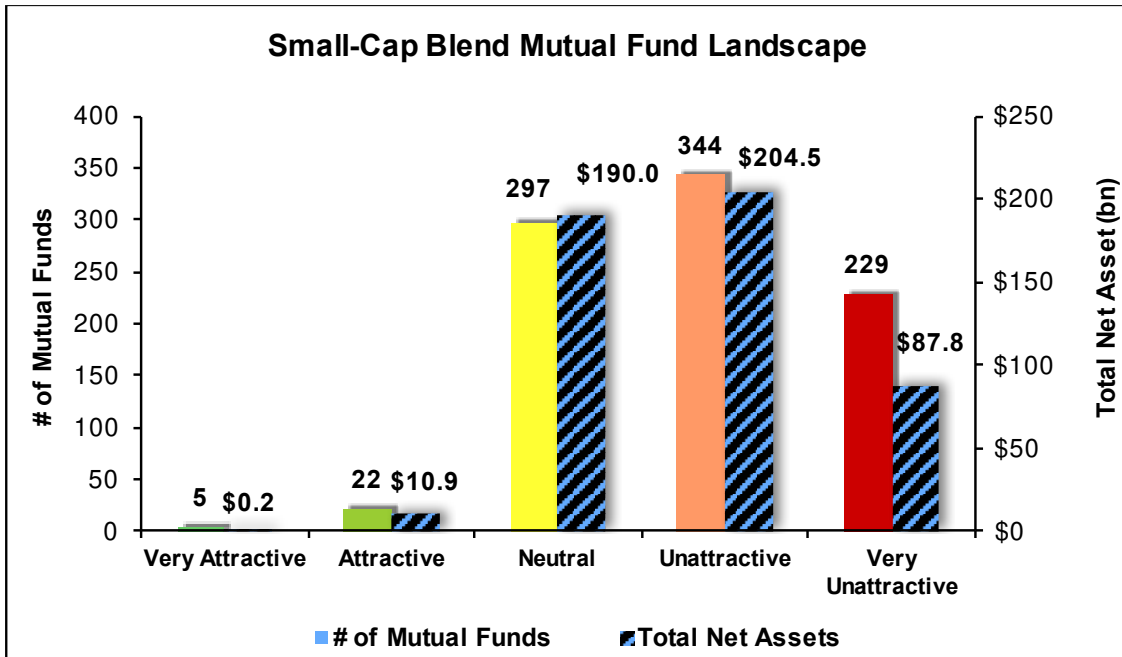
