



ETF & Mutual Fund Rankings: Technology Sector

The Technology sector ranks third out of the 11 sectors as detailed in our <u>1Q18 Sector Ratings for ETFs and</u> <u>Mutual Funds</u> report. <u>Last quarter</u>, the Technology sector ranked third as well. It gets our Neutral rating, which is based on an aggregation of ratings of 42 ETFs and 127 mutual funds in the Technology sector as of January 9, 2018. Figures 1 and 2 show the five best and worst rated ETFs and mutual funds in the sector. Not all Technology sector ETFs and mutual funds are created the same. The number of holdings varies widely (from 20 to 370). This variation creates drastically different investment implications and, therefore, ratings.

Investors seeking exposure to the Technology sector should buy one of the Attractive-or-better rated ETFs or mutual funds from Figures 1 and 2.

Fidelity Advisor Communications Equipment Fund (FDMIX) and ICON Information Technology Fund (ICTEX) are excluded from Figure 2 because their total net assets (TNA) are below \$100 million and do not meet our liquidity minimums.

State Street Technology Select Sector SPDR (XLK) is the top-rated Technology ETF and Fidelity Select Communication Equipment Portfolio (FSDCX) is the top-rated Technology mutual fund. Both earn a Very Attractive rating.

ARK Innovation ETF (ARKK) is the worst rated Technology ETF and Wells Fargo Specialized Technology Fund (WSFTX) is the worst rated Technology mutual fund. Both earn a Very Unattractive rating.

427 stocks of the 3000+ we cover are classified as Technology stocks.






Figure 4: Separating the Best Mutual Funds from the Worst Mutual Funds
