

How to Find the Best Style ETFs

Finding the best ETFs is an increasingly difficult task in a world with so many to choose from. How can you pick with so many choices available?

Don't Trust ETF Labels

There are at least 112 different All Cap Blend ETFs and at least 446 ETFs across twelve styles. Do investors need 40+ choices on average per style? How different can the ETFs be?

Those 112 All Cap Blend ETFs are very different. With anywhere from 18 to 3615 holdings, many of these All Cap Blend ETFs have drastically different portfolios, creating drastically different investment implications.

The same is true for the ETFs in any other style, as each offers a very different mix of good and bad stocks. Large Cap Blend ranks first for stock selection. Small Cap Value ranks last. Details on the <u>Best & Worst ETFs in</u> each style are here.

How to Avoid Paralysis By Analysis

We think the large number of All Cap Blend (or any other) style ETFs hurts investors more than it helps because too many options can be paralyzing. It is simply not possible for the majority of investors to properly assess the quality of so many ETFs. Analyzing ETFs, done with the proper diligence, is far more difficult than analyzing stocks because it means analyzing all the stocks within each ETF. As stated above, that can be as many as 3615 stocks, and sometimes even more, for one ETF.

Anyone focused on <u>fulfilling the fiduciary duty of care</u> recognizes that analyzing the holdings¹ of an ETF is critical to finding the best ETF. Figure 1 shows our top-rated ETF for each style.

Amongst the ETFs in Figure 1, Alpha Architect U.S. Quantitative Value ETF (QVAL) ranks first overall, WisdomTree Dynamic Long/Short U.S. Equity Fund (DYLS) ranks second, and First Trust Rising Dividend Achievers ETF (RDVY) ranks third. State Street SPDR SSGA U.S. Small Cap Low Volatility Index ETF (SMLV) ranks last.

Alpha Architect U.S. Quantitative Value ETF (QVAL) is not only the top-rated All Cap Value ETF but is also the overall top-ranked style ETF out of the 446 style ETFs that we cover.

The worst ETF in Figure 1 is State Street SPDR SSGA U.S. Small Cap Low Volatility Index ETF (SMLV), which gets a Neutral rating. One would think ETF providers could do better for this style.
