



ETF & Mutual Fund Rankings: Technology Sector

The Technology sector ranks fourth out of the 11 sectors as detailed in our [2Q18 Sector Ratings for ETFs and Mutual Funds](#) report. [Last quarter](#), the Technology sector ranked third. It gets our Neutral rating, which is based on an aggregation of ratings of 44 ETFs and 126 mutual funds in the Technology sector as of April 10, 2018. See a recap of our [1Q18 Sector Ratings here](#).

Figures 1 and 2 show the five best and worst rated ETFs and mutual funds in the sector. Not all Technology sector ETFs and mutual funds are created the same. The number of holdings varies widely (from 25 to 359). This variation creates drastically different investment implications and, therefore, ratings.

Investors seeking exposure to the Technology sector should buy one of the Attractive-or-better rated ETFs or mutual funds from Figures 1 and 2.

Fidelity Advisor Communications Equipment Fund (FDMIX) is excluded from Figure 2 because its total net assets (TNA) are below \$100 million and do not meet our liquidity minimums.

First Trust NASDAQ Technology Dividend Index Fund (TDIV) is the top-rated Technology ETF and Fidelity Select Communications Equipment Portfolio (FSDCX) is the top-rated Technology mutual fund. Both earn a Very Attractive rating.

State Street SPDR S&P Internet ETF (XWEB) is the worst rated Technology ETF and Rydex Series Electronics Fund (RYELX) is the worst rated Technology mutual fund. XWEB earns an Unattractive rating and RYELX earns a Very Unattractive rating.

422 stocks of the 3000+ we cover are classified as Technology stocks.

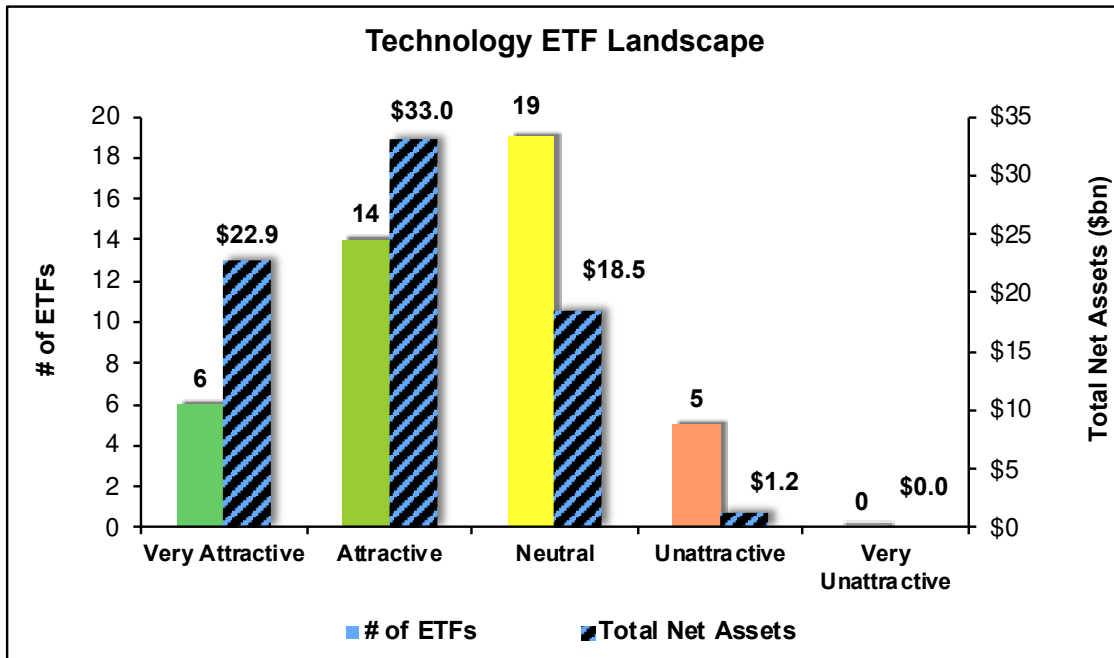

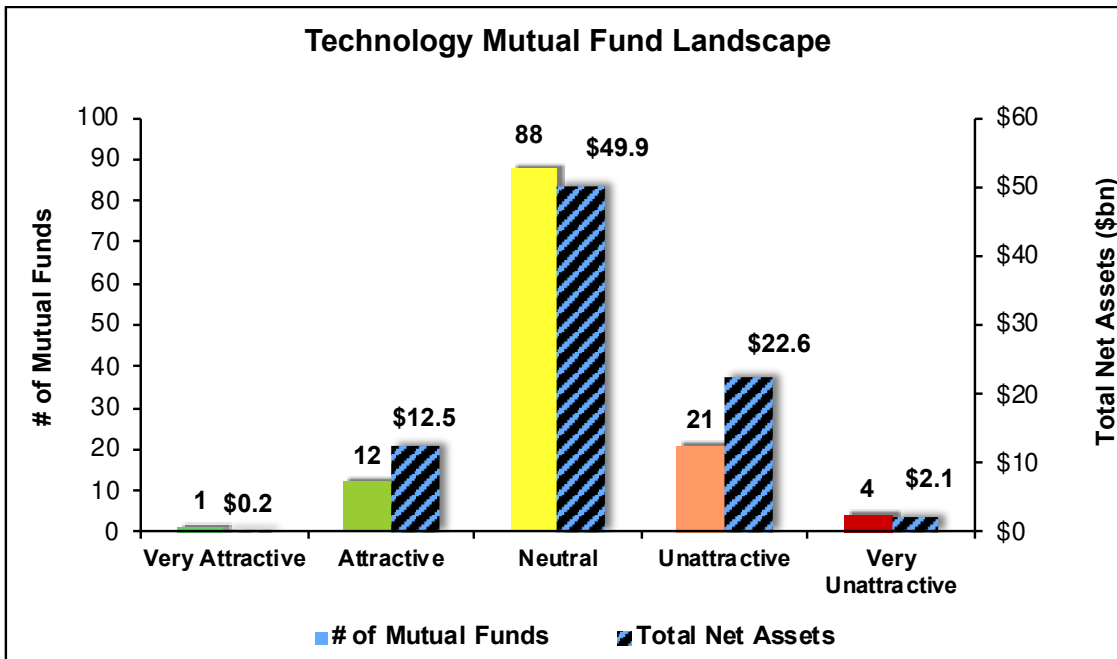
