ETF & Mutual Fund Rankings: Small Cap Growth Style

The Small Cap Growth style ranks last out of the twelve fund styles as detailed in our <u>4Q18 Style Ratings for ETFs and Mutual Funds</u> report. <u>Last quarter</u>, the Small Cap Growth style ranked last as well. It gets our Very Unattractive rating, which is based on an aggregation of ratings of 14 ETFs and 375 mutual funds in the Small Cap Growth style as of October 25, 2018. Figures 1 and 2 show the five best and worst rated ETFs and mutual funds in the style. Not all Small Cap Growth style ETFs and mutual funds are created the same. The number of holdings varies widely (from 29 to 2541). This variation creates drastically different investment implications and, therefore, ratings.

RIVSX is excluded from Figure 2 because its total net assets (TNA) are below \$100 million and do not meet our liquidity minimums.

RFG is the top-rated Small Cap Growth ETF and VSCRX is the top-rated Small Cap Growth mutual fund. RFG earns an Attractive rating and VSCRX earns a Very Attractive rating.

JKK is the worst rated Small Cap Growth ETF and BSLAX is the worst rated Small Cap Growth mutual fund. Both earn a Very Unattractive rating.




