Finding the best ETFs is an increasingly difficult task in a world with so many to choose from. How can you pick with so many choices available?

Don't Trust ETF Labels

There are at least 47 different Technology ETFs and at least 232 ETFs across eleven sectors. Do investors need 21+ choices on average per sector? How different can the ETFs be?

Those 47 Technology ETFs are very different. With anywhere from 13 to 319 holdings, many of these Technology ETFs have drastically different portfolios, creating drastically different investment implications.

The same is true for the ETFs in any other sector, as each offers a very different mix of good and bad stocks. Financials rank first for stock selection. Real Estate ranks last. Details on the Best & Worst ETFs in each sector are here.

How to Avoid Paralysis by Analysis

We think the large number of Technology (or any other) sector ETFs hurts investors more than it helps because too many options can be paralyzing. It is simply not possible for the majority of investors to properly assess the quality of so many ETFs. Analyzing ETFs, done with the proper diligence¹, is far more difficult than analyzing stocks because it means analyzing all the stocks within each ETF. As stated above, there can be as many as 319 stocks or more for one ETF.

Anyone focused on <u>fulfilling the fiduciary duty of care</u> recognizes that analyzing the holdings² of an ETF is critical to finding the best ETF. Figure 1 shows our top-rated ETF for each sector.

Amongst the ETFs in Figure 1, iShares MSCI Global Metals & Mining (PICK) ranks first overall, First Trust NASDAQ Bank ETF (FTXO) ranks second, and Fidelity MSCI Consumer Staples Index (FSTA) ranks third. Fidelity MSCI Utilities Index (FUTY) ranks last.

Our <u>ETF ratings</u> leverage our <u>stock coverage</u>. We rate ETFs based on the aggregated ratings of the stocks each ETF holds.

iShares MSCI Global Metals & Mining Producers ETF (PICK) is not only the top-rated Basic Materials ETF, but is also the overall top-ranked sector ETF out of the 232 sector ETFs that we cover.

The worst ETF in Figure 1 is Fidelity MSCI Utilities Index (FUTY), which gets an Unattractive rating. One would think ETF providers could do better for this sector.
