

# ETF & Mutual Fund Rankings: Mid Cap Value Style

The Mid Cap Value style ranks sixth out of the twelve fund styles as detailed in our <u>2Q20 Style Ratings for ETFs</u> and <u>Mutual Funds</u> report. Last quarter, the Mid Cap Value style ranked eighth. It gets our Neutral rating, which is based on an aggregation of ratings of 13 ETFs and 144 mutual funds in the Mid Cap Value style as of April 24, 2020. Figure 1 ranks from best to worst the seven Mid Cap Value ETFs that meet our liquidity standards and Figure 2 shows the five best and worst rated Mid Cap Value mutual funds. Not all Mid Cap Value style ETFs and mutual funds are created the same. The number of holdings varies widely (from 21 to 675). This variation creates drastically different investment implications and, therefore, ratings.

Fidelity Mid Cap Value K6 Fund (FCMVX) is excluded from Figure 2 because its total net assets (TNA) are below \$100 million and do not meet our liquidity minimums.

State Street SPDR Russell 1000 Yield Focus ETF (ONEY) is the top-rated Mid Cap Value ETF and Fidelity Advisor Mid Cap Value Fund (FIDFX) is the top-rated Mid Cap Value mutual fund. Both earn a Very Attractive rating.

Nuveen ESG Mid Cap Value ETF (NUMV) is the worst rated Mid Cap Value ETF and Transamerica Small/Mid Cap Value (IIVAX) is the worst rated Mid Cap Value mutual fund. NUMV earns a Neutral rating and IIVAX earns a Very Unattractive rating.

Put another way, research on fund holdings is necessary due diligence because a fund's performance is only as good as its holdings' performance. 




#### Figure 3: Separating the Best ETFs from the Worst Funds
