



ETF & Mutual Fund Rankings: Mid Cap Value Style

The Mid Cap Value style ranks seventh out of the twelve fund styles as detailed in our [3Q20 Style Ratings for ETFs and Mutual Funds](#) report. [Last quarter](#), the Mid Cap Value style ranked sixth. It gets our Neutral rating, which is based on an aggregation of ratings of 12 ETFs and 140 mutual funds in the Mid Cap Value style as of July 22, 2020. Figures 1 and 2 show the best and worst rated ETFs and mutual funds in the style. Not all Mid Cap Value style ETFs and mutual funds are created the same. The number of holdings varies widely (from 31 to 688). This variation creates drastically different investment implications and, therefore, ratings.

Fidelity Mid Cap Value K6 Fund (FCMVX) is excluded from Figure 2 because its total net assets (TNA) are below \$100 million and do not meet our liquidity minimums.

Alpha Architect US Quantitative Value ETF (QVAL) is the top-rated Mid Cap Value ETF and Fidelity Advisor Mid Cap Value Fund (FIDFX) is the top-rated Mid Cap Value mutual fund. Both earn a Very Attractive rating.

First Trust Dorsey Wright Momentum & Value ETF (DVLU) is the worst rated Mid Cap Value ETF and Transamerica Small/Mid Cap Value (IIVAX) is the worst rated Mid Cap Value mutual fund. DVLU earns a Neutral rating and IIVAX earns a Very Unattractive rating.

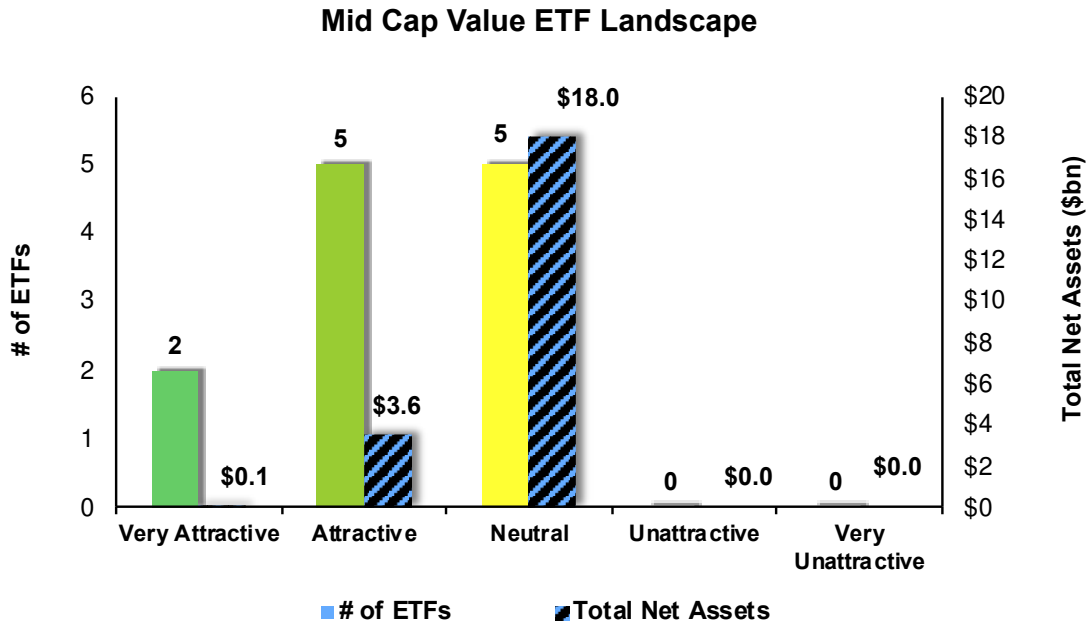

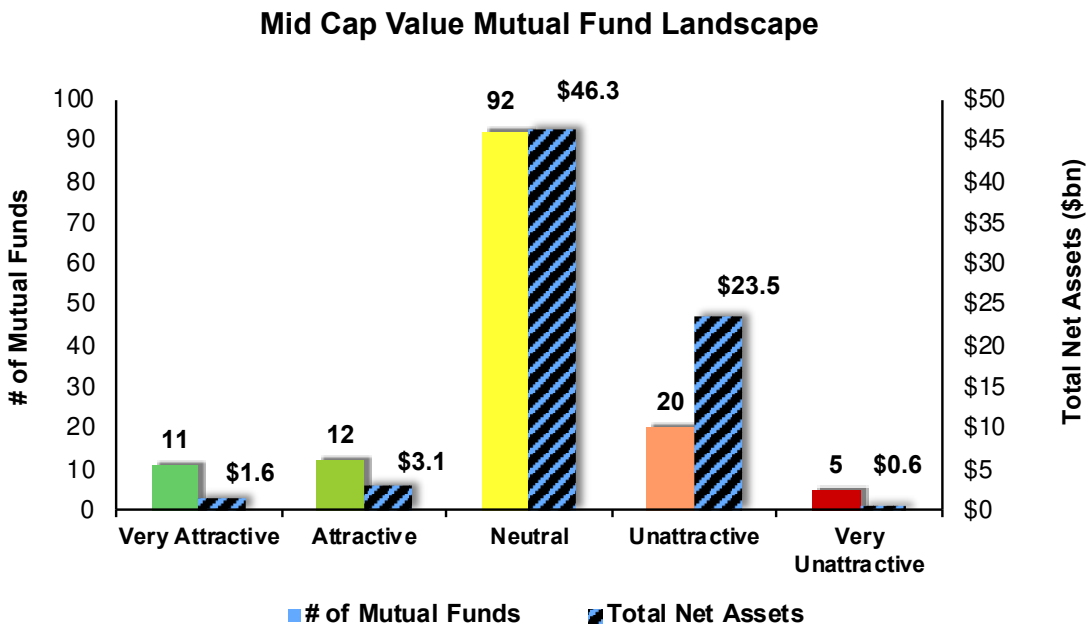
