



ETF & Mutual Fund Rankings: Small Cap Blend Style

The Small Cap Blend style ranks tenth out of the twelve fund styles as detailed in our [4Q20 Style Ratings for ETFs and Mutual Funds](#) report. [Last quarter](#), the Small Cap Blend style ranked tenth as well. It gets our Unattractive rating, which is based on an aggregation of ratings of 57 ETFs and 775 mutual funds in the Small Cap Blend style as of October 21, 2020. Figures 1 and 2 show the five best and worst rated ETFs and mutual funds in the style. Not all Small Cap Blend style ETFs and mutual funds are created the same. The number of holdings varies widely (from 25 to 2560). This variation creates drastically different investment implications and, therefore, ratings.

American Beacon Zebra Small Cap Equity Fund (AZSIX, AZSYX, AZSPX), James Small Cap Fund (JASCX) and PGIM QMA Mid Cap Core Equity Fund (PQCCX) are excluded from Figure 2 because their total net assets (TNA) are below \$100 million and do not meet our liquidity minimums.

Invesco S&P Mid Cap Low Volatility ETF (XMLV) is the top-rated Small Cap Blend ETF and Royce Small Cap Value Fund (RVVHX) is the top-rated Small Cap Blend mutual fund. Both earn a Very Attractive rating.

First Trust Small Cap Core AlphaDEX Fund (FYX) is the worst rated Small Cap Blend ETF and ProFunds Small Cap ProFund (SLPSX) is the worst rated Small Cap Blend mutual fund. FYX earns an Unattractive rating and SLPSX earns a Very Unattractive rating.

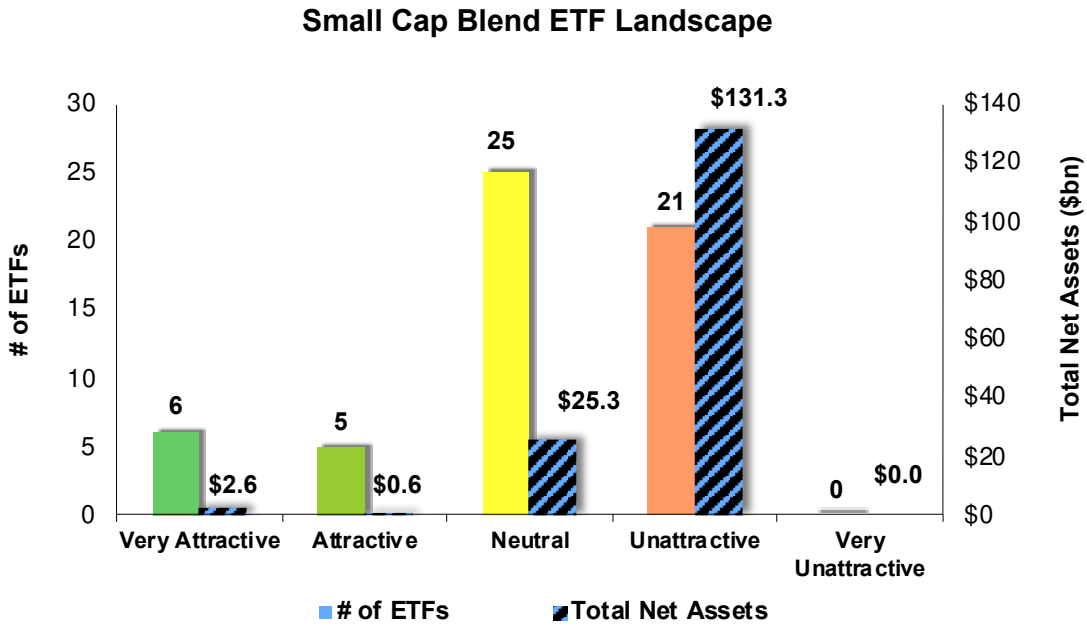

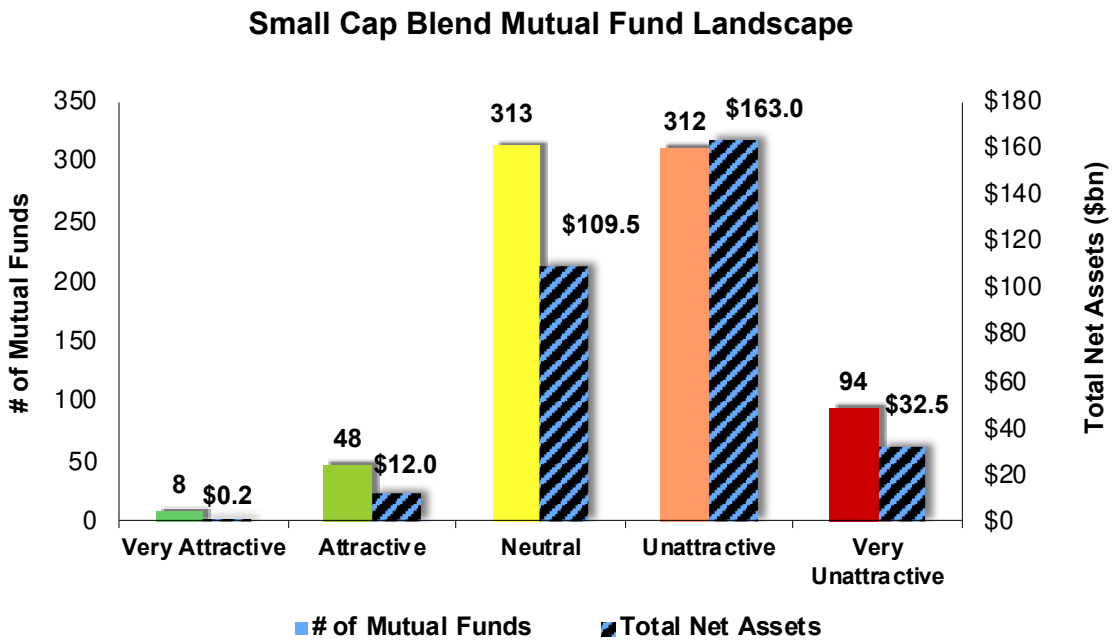
